Summary of 2019 ACST Prioritized Goals

Goal 1: To Grow and Reach New Disciples of Jesus Christ

By encouraging individuals in the life-long practice of developing and strengthening a personal relationship with God;



By supporting congregations in fostering discipleship in all of their ministries; and

By sharing the Good News with people who do not know Jesus.

Goal 2: To Live Out the Conviction that Racism is Incompatible with Christian Teaching

By encouraging individuals to engage in ongoing self-reflection, cross-cultural sharing, and growth;



By challenging the structures, practices and policies of the NIC and instituting necessary changes to ensure equity; and

By educating and equipping congregations, districts and the NIC to be prophetic leaders pursuing equity in society.

Goal 3: To Increase the Number of Highly Vital Congregations

By actively and intentionally practicing stewardship of the NIC's ministry resources:



By conducting a comprehensive assessment of ministry resources and the future potential of every congregation; and

By creating and executing a plan with each congregation in collaboration with the district.



We recognize that the pursuit of these goals will be challenging and will require discipline, self-evaluation, self-sacrifice, mutual support and strengthened connection.



Next Steps

Create teams to develop a 2-year implementation plan for the three interrelated goals.

Action Plans

- Design structure, identify participants, and build accountability for all three goals
- Communicate and coordinate plans across the conference
- Establish measures to evaluate the progress of each goal and report to the Annual Conference

The Church is called to lead by our example within our own lives, our institution, and by prophetic witness in society.

Congregations will strive to identify, challenge and change values, attitudes, organizational structures, policies and practices that perpetuate systemic racism by engaging in:

- Prayerful self-reflection to identify racist attitudes and grow in relationship with Jesus and love of our neighbor
- Understanding the impact of racism, the concept of unconscious bias, how race shapes one's place and understanding of society, and the idea of privilege
- Peaceful yet active, prophetic resistance to racism in church and society
- Equitable sharing of power by ensuring meaningful access to positions of leadership

Creating Vital Congregations

All of you together are the body of Christ. Each one of you is a part of that body. (1 Corinthians 12.27)

Empowering congregations to assess themselves and imagine new possibilities.



Currently, 360 freestanding United Methodist Churches exist in Northern Illinois. As a connection, the entire NIC is responsible for holding up those churches that lack signs of vitality. For long term sustainability, our Annual Conference must nurture spiritual vitality and exercise stewardship over all of our ministry resources.

To attain the goal of vitality, every congregation will undergo a financial, facility, and organizational assessment and, with the assistance of the District Superintendent, create a sustainable plan for the future. This plan is intended to optimize ministry potential, whether as a continued organized church, in cooperation with other parish(es), as a merged UMC church or in ecumenical shared ministries, through redevelopment, relocation, or discontinuance.
