### **Annual Conference Leadership**

Bishop Sally Dyck grew up in rural Washington State. Her home church is on the corner of a wheat field about 20 miles from any town. She grew up on a farm nearby. Now, when asked where she is from, she says, "I'm from I-90. I-90 goes by where I was born and raised. I-90 has a ramp to Boston University where I graduated from college and Boston University School of Theology where I went to seminary. I spent 25 years of ministry as a pastor and a district superintendent in the Cleveland, Ohio area and I-90 goes through that area. After I was elected a bishop in 2004, I was assigned to the Minnesota Annual Conference and I-90 goes through the southern part of the state. I was assigned to the Northern Illinois Annual Conference in 2012 and reassigned for another four years in 2016. I walk across I-90 to go to my office at the Temple/First UMC in Chicago. I'm from I-90! Now as I move on to retirement, I will be living near I-80 in California."

As a bishop, she spends nearly every Sunday (or more) in local churches throughout the conference. Since coming to Northern Illinois, Bishop Sally has worked to help the Northern Illinois Conference strengthen its capacity to fulfill its purpose (given in the Book of Discipline): "to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world by equipping its local churches for ministry and by providing a connection for ministry beyond the local church; all to the glory of God." Bishop Dyck presently serves as the President of the General Board of Church and Society for The United Methodist Church, President of the National Hispanic Plan and is a member of the Central Committee of the World Council of Churches. In retirement Bishop Dyck has been elected to serve as the Ecumenical Officer for the Council of Bishops.

Bishop Dyck has been married to Rev. Dr. Kenneth P. Ehrman since 1976. Ken is a retired UM pastor and former Director of Field Education at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois.


Memorial Service Preacher Woody Bedell was the NIC Director of Benefits and Human Resources until his passing on November 1, 2020 after a long-term journey with cancer. In his position with NIC, Woody helped in the design, implementation and explanation of the benefit programs provided by the conference and Wespath, as well as managing the conference staff human resource needs. Previously, Woody had been the Benefits Officer for the Virginia Conference, Chief Strategic Relations Officer at Wespath and Director of Benefits for the Reformed Church in America. Woody was a member of Libertyville United Methodist Church where he taught adult classes and played in the contemporary band for more than 20 years. At one point, he said he was crazy enough to participate in the Hawaiian Ironman Triathlon twice.







### **Annual Conference Leadership (continued)**



Worship Leader Rev. Rich Rubietta is an Elder from the Northern Illinois Conference and has been a Circuit Riding *Musicianary* for 20 years. Rich criss-crosses the Midwest each weekend to help create family-friendly worship experiences with local church musicians. With the creative use of music, he helps children, parents and grandparents worship happily together, crafting upbeat worship experiences that defy categories of traditional or "contemporary." His mission is to use music to help bring people closer to God and to one another. Learn more at umcalive.org.

Rich has a music degree from Northwestern University, an MDiv from Trinity Divinity School in Deerfield, and has pastored churches in Freeport, Morris, Joliet and Grayslake in Illinois.



**Bible Study Leader Rev. Junius B. Dotson**, a nationally recognized leader, speaker, and author, is the General Secretary (chief executive officer) of <u>Discipleship Ministries</u>, an international agency of The United Methodist Church, an organization with a staff of more than 130. Dotson was elected General Secretary in 2016.

Under Dotson's leadership, Discipleship Ministries has worked toward having the 11-million member denomination ensure every congregation has an intentional discipleship system, engages with people currently outside the church, and cultivates local (contextual) resources around the globe.

Rev. Dotson is the author of Soul Reset: Breakdown, Breakthrough, and the Journey to Wholeness (Upper Room Books). Released to national acclaim, the book is a 6-week study for everyone who moves at breakneck speed through daily life.

Rev. Dotson was a member of a team of 16 global United Methodist leaders, across a wide theological spectrum, toward a proposal that would preserve The United Methodist Church while allowing traditionalist-minded congregations to form a new denomination. The proposal was reached with the help of famed mediator Kenneth Feinberg, who worked on the federal September 11th Victim Compensation Fund.

Dotson launched "See All The People", the highly successful church-wide initiative that helps church leaders concentrate on intentional discipleship, while learning new behaviors around engaging their surrounding community.

Prior to his present position, Rev. Dotson was Senior Pastor of Saint Mark United Methodist Church in Wichita, Kansas, where he was instrumental in transforming the 3,500-member church into a multi-campus congregation.





### 2020 Awards and Recognition

### Bishop Jess R. DeWitt Child Advocacy Award

While serving as our bishop from 1980 to 1988, Bishop Jesse R. DeWitt led by example as he participated, represented and spoke out for children, youth and families who did not have a voice. One of his greatest passions was speaking out to educate and inform local churches about legislation and issues impacting the lives of children.

#### PRESENTED TO Rev. Gregory Gross, The Night Ministry



The Rev. Gregory Gross was the Director of Mission Fulfillment for the Night Ministry in Chicago. In that role Gregory provided housing, health care, spiritual care and social services to families and individuals experiencing poverty and homelessness, particularly youth. His work with "The Crib" is particularly notable. This overnight emergency shelter for young adults, ages 18-24, many of them LGBTQ, has become a model for youth shelters across the city and state. In addition, Rev. Gross has worked as a youth minister in several congregations in Northern Illinois and has served faithfully on conference committees. Throughout his ministry he encouraged and lifted young voices, working to create a church that is as welcoming to young persons as it is to older, lifelong members.

Gregory uses his many gifts and graces to ensure that programs that serve the most vulnerable among us—from youth who are homeless and also experiencing racism or discrimination because of their sexual and gender

identities, to adults and families with significant unmet needs due to housing and financial insecurity—create opportunities for human connection and fulfillment. He is currently the Executive Director for Care for Real.

#### Katherine Greene Child Worker Award

Katherine B. Greene was a past president and founding representative of United Voices for Children who put forth tremendous efforts in promoting child advocacy, working faithfully against child abuse advancing and supporting children with unmet needs across the Northern Illinois Conference. She reminded and challenged us to step up, step forth and speak out for children.

## PRESENTED TO Rev. Dr. Barbara Javore, Glencoe: North Shore (Co-honoree)

The Rev. Dr. Barbara Javore has served as Director of Children and Family Ministries at North Shore UMC for 26 years. Deacon Barbara demonstrates remarkable passion for serving children and youth, particularly by thinking of new ways to "meet the youth where they are." She recently created a confirmation curriculum drawing on Biblically-based and progressive theology. She designed the curriculum so that the confirmands gathered once a month for an intensive and richly-rewarding time of education, service and fellowship. Every quarter Deacon Barbara designs a unique worship experience for children and youth that pulls in many young families that engage more peripherally in the congregation and keeps them connected to the congregation. A highlight is the annual Christmas Pageant which plays to a capacity crowd. Deacon Barbara creatively uses liturgy and visuals to



enable children to learn the timeless Biblical narrative of Christ's birth and to grow in their faith. Through her ministry children that have remarkable talents are able to shine; those who may have learning disabilities or mental illness find confidence and recognition; and parents who struggle each day to motivate their children receive care and encouragement.

## PRESENTED TO Michelle Barton, Mt. Prospect: Trinity (Co-honoree)

Michelle Barton provides extraordinary leadership and support for refugee families seeking asylum in this country through her affiliation with the Facebook Group "6,000 Moms." Michelle has been a mentor for refugee families, provided assistance with housing, food, employment and transportation as well as assisting families needing to obtain authorization to stay in the U.S. Michelle regularly lifts up the 6000 Moms group and their efforts in her congregation and offers prayers for families being assisted, so that the names and faces of these families are made real.

Michelle is a public-school teacher who advocates for children and families in many arenas. She has advocated for the Early Childhood Education program



at the College of DuPage; worked on behalf of children in need of domestic adoption; spoken up for children at most risk in her school district as well as for children that are separated from their parents at the Mexican border. Michelle hears of a need and opens her arms to embrace the person with joyful, welcoming warmth and meet the need. Michelle gives to others selflessly, regardless of the financial or time commitment, and makes a difference in the lives of many children and families.



#### **Terms**

Alternate Member: One who is elected to serve should the member of their congregation be unable to attend or participate in Annual Conference.

Bar (of the Conference): The boundaries that define the area in which votes for Annual Conference matters may be cast.

Building Beloved Community: Provided by CORR and COSROW offering reflections on participation, tone and balance of proceedings.

**Daily Proceedings:** Order of business while we are together as an Annual Conference.

**Delegate:** One is elected as a delegate to General or Jurisdictional Conference.

**Member:** One is a clergy or lay member of Annual Conference Session.

**Motion:** The way the Conference acts on legislation. For example, should someone want to amend a piece of legislation that is before the Annual Conference, you would seek the Bishop's attention and state "I move we amend" (filling in the blank with the way they would like to see the document amended). If that motion is seconded, it would be brought before the Conference for action.

**North Central Jurisdiction:** The Northern Illinois Annual Conference is part of the North Central Jurisdiction, which includes the states of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, North/South Dakota, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Every four years the North Central Jurisdiction and other jurisdictional conferences meet to discuss and vote upon new bishop appointments, converse about matters of the Jurisdiction, worship, and fellowship together.

Order of the Day: The agenda as agreed upon by the Annual Conference and established by the Chair of Daily Proceedings in consultation with the Bishop.

Organizing Motions: Motions made at the beginning of our work so that we all know what the agreed upon rules for working together are, for example: where people with a vote are allowed to sit, where people without a vote are allowed to sit (there are other rules as well).

**Plenary:** The plenary compromises all members entitled to be seated within the bar of Annual Conference Session.

**Point of Order:** A call to attention to make sure that the correct procedure is being followed.

**Preliminary Consent Calendar:** Grouping of legislation that is put together before Annual Conference by the committee in consultation with the Bishop. The Consent Calendar will be presented as a resolution in which the reports listed can be approved in one motion rather than separate motions for each item, A vote of the Consent Calendar enacts everything the consent calendar recommends. If a member would like something removed from the Consent Calendar, they would need 25 members of Annual Conference (lay or clergy) to send an email to acdocuments@ umcnic.org in support of its removal by midnight Nov. 1, 2020.

Robert's Rules of Order: Rules by which we have agreed to function as we meet. A motion needs a second in order for it to be voted upon, etc. so that there is a method to our work together.

**Second:** Someone agrees with the motion and desires the body proceed to work with motion.
