



Dear Partners in Ministry:

Annual Conference Leadership

Bishop Dan Schwerin is serving as the resident bishop in the Northern Illinois Conference for 2023. Bishop Schwerin was elected to the episcopacy at the North Central Jurisdiction gathering in November 2022.

Bishop Schwerin (he, him, his) is husband to his wife, Julie, and a father, grandfather, and poet. Jesus is the gold in his life. He is a graduate of Perkins School of Theology and did post-graduate Bowen family systems theory work there. He has enjoyed many contexts for pastoral ministry, including urban and rural churches, a new-church plant, and superintendent of two districts. He also pastored a multi-staff downtown church, which became a Reconciling Congregation and launched a beloved community of nonprofits that benefitted children dealing with poverty, people who wanted to battle generational poverty, and offered music lessons for children.



After the General Conference of 2019, Bishop Schwerin was asked by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung to lead a collaborative effort with conference partners to increase racial justice and radical inclusion. He then served as Assistant to the Bishop in the Wisconsin Conference. He has also served on the General Conference Task Force on Funding Patterns in the UMC.

Dan and Julie love evening walks and labyrinths. His poetry comes from life on a farm or making his rounds across thirty-plus years as a pastor in Wisconsin. His debut haiku collection, *Ors*, from Red Moon Press, won the Haiku Foundation's Touchstone Award in 2015.



Ecumenical Guest, Rev. Molly Carlson, has served as the Conference Minister of the Illinois Conference of the United Church of Christ since August 2020. Prior to serving in this role, Rev. Carlson served in local, regional and national settings of the church. Her ministry has taken her to Indiana, Kentucky, Oregon, California, Idaho, Pennsylvania, Washington and Tennessee. She currently lives in Dekalb, IL, with her husband, Michael, their two young adult children and several pets.

Memorial Service Preacher, Rev. Dr. Myron F. McCoy, serves as Senior Pastor of First United Methodist Church at the Chicago Temple. He previously served as president of the Saint Paul School of Theology, and pastor at the St. Mark and South Shore United Methodist Churches in Chicago. He has also served as a District Superintendent in the Northern Illinois Conference.

Beyond the local church Dr. McCoy serves as a Trustee of Ohio Wesleyan University, chair of the Board of Directors of the Greater Chicago Broadcast Ministries and serves on the Board of Directors for Kids Above All and Illinois Churches in Action. In previous years Dr. McCoy served in NIC as co-chair of the Shepherding Team and chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Dr. McCoy has also served as Chair of the United Methodist University Senate, the NCJ Committee of the Episcopacy,



and Board of the UM Publishing House. He has been on the UM National Shalom Committee, Co-Chair of the Task Force to Study the Episcopacy of the UMC 2004-2008, and a trustee of Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, Baker University, and the Association of Theological Schools.

Dr. McCoy holds a B.A. from Ohio Wesleyan University, an M.Div. from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, and a DMin. from United Theological Seminary. Dr. McCoy is also a recipient of honorary doctorates from both Baker University and United Theological Seminary. Dr. McCoy is married to Karen (Fulgham), and they are the parents of three adult sons: Justin, Armand, and Marlen, and grandparents to Miles and Karli.

Bible Study Leader, Dr. Rolf Nolasco, is the Rueben P. Job Professor of spiritual formation and pastoral theology at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary and director of the Rueben P. Job Institute for Spiritual Formation.

Dr. Nolasco is an experienced professor, trained in pastoral and counseling psychology, mindfulness and contemplative spirituality, and affective neuroscience. Nolasco is also a psychotherapist, published author, and has vast experience in cross-cultural communications from living and working across the world within varying social and cultural backgrounds. In addition to *Hearts Ablaze: Para-*

bles for the Queer Soul, he is the author of God's Beloved Queer, The Contemplative Counselor: A Way of Being, and Compassionate Presence: A Radical Response to Human Suffering.

Worship Leader, Rev. Dr. Addison Shields, Jr., is an ordained Elder of the United Methodist Church and retired July 1, 2014, after serving the denomination for 34 years. He pastored six congregations in the Northern Illinois Conference before his retirement. Dr. Shields also served as the District Superintendent for the former Rockford and Chicago Southern Districts. He is currently serving as senior pastor for Transformation Community United Methodist Church in Harvey, Ill. Dr. Shield's musical ministry started at a young age. He was the organist for many churches across the Chicago Metropolitan area. He studied voice under the late Thelma Wade Brown at American Conservatory of Music at Roosevelt University. While singing with the Kennedy-King College Community Choir, he was



part of the guest chorale performing with the Ohio Philharmonics, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and performances at Carnegie Hall in New York City. Dr. Shields sings baritone as a member of the South Holland Master Chorale in South Holland, III.



Musician, Wanda J. Bishop, aka Joy, is an accomplished educator, worship leader, keyboardist, songwriter, and vocalist, affectionately called "the little energetic lady with an infectious smile!" At present, Wanda is employed at Our Lady of Africa Catholic Parish and as music director for Maple Park United Methodist Church. She is adept at a broad range of musical styles and genres and has formerly served as Minister of Music in many Chicago churches. Wanda was Director of Youth Ministry at Beth Eden Baptist for ten years. Wanda is a member of the Chicago Music Association and sings with the Chicago Community Choir. She was a former Chicago Public School substitute Music teacher at Grant Elementary and Longwood Academy Charter Schools.

She is an established local and international artist. She is a published songwriter and has recorded with Jazz Flutist Nicole Mitchell on the Afrika Rising CD. Wanda completed two international tours to perform as Assistant Music Director for The Harlem Gospel Singers in 2018 and returned in 2019 as Pianist for Rev. Calvin Bridges Ministries. Wanda's musical gifts opened doors for her to minister and perform in ten international countries to date. In the Chicago Theater community, she's been contracted as Composer, Music Director, Instructor, and Pianist.



Annual Conference Committee Chair, Deborah Dangerfield, has been an active member of Maple Park UMC in Chicago since 1963. In the NIC, she

serves or has served on the Nominations Committee, Board of Pensions, ACST, BMCR, and the Inter-Ethnic Strategic Development Group. She has also served as a jurisdiction delegate. Deborah has a master's degree in both business and health care.

Deaconesses (and home missioners) are laity called by God to a lifetime relationship in The United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice and service. (¶ 1913) Deaconesses are consecrated by a bishop, then commissioned in their local annual conference.

Local Pastors answer God's call to serve the mission of Jesus Christ in a local congregation under the authority of a license for pastoral ministry. They are not itinerant ministers and are not ordained or elected into full membership of the annual conference. A local pastor's authority is within their appointment setting and does not extend beyond it.

Deacons are called by God, authorized by the church, and ordained by a bishop to a lifetime ministry of Word, Service, Compassion, and Justice. They serve the community and congregation in a ministry that connects the two. The deacon's ministry connects the church's worship with its service in the world (11) 328-331).

Elders are called by God, authorized by the church, and ordained by a bishop to a lifetime ministry of Word, Sacrament, Order, and Service. The elder serves in ministry and servant leadership giving pastoral leadership to order the life of the congregation. (¶¶ 332-335).

Commissioned/Provisional Members are in the ordination step between candidacy and full membership. Those applying for ordination serve as a provisional member for a minimum of two years. Provisional membership ends with ordination. (11) 324-327).

Full Connection/Full Members are an ordained deacon or elder that serves as a full member in an annual conference. Their life and work is amenable to the annual conference and they are supported by and accountable to that annual conference.





This is well-known song that expresses Korean people's yearning for peace and reunification in Korea. This song is popular in both North and South Korea. The song's lyrics were composed by the highly-gifted artist Ahn Seok-Ju during Korea's period of colonization by Japan, while the song's melody was composed by Ahn's son, Byeong-Won. The lyrics in the original version of the song read, "Our hope is Independence", but after Korea gained its independence from Japan and the nation of Korea was divided in two, the song's lyrics were changed to "Our hope is Reunification". This song captures the painful history of the Korean nation. At the Inter-Korean Summit in June of 2000, Kim Dae-Jung and Kim Jong-Il held hands and sang the song together. In this service, the English version uses "our hope is peace" instead of "our hope is reunification" to make the song more singable and to point to the global need for peace.

The Korean clergy choir will sing in Korean once. All are invited to sing in Korean and then in English. English translation is based on the Korean lyrics but not a direct translation.

Child Safety & Active Shooter Training Modules

Available at no cost!

Philadelphia Insurance, in partnership with the Northern Illinois Conference, is making online trainings on child safety and active shooter available at no cost. For UMC churches participating in the conference insurance program, *Skillful Screening* and *Parent Training* modules are available through the conference risk management department.

Web-based training offered:

Skillful Screening (130 minutes)

When bringing on new volunteers or paid staff to work with children, background checks are prudent and necessary. However, fewer than 10% of sexual abusers have a criminal record, which is why skillful screening is necessary, along with background checks.

Through this training, church leaders will learn:

- How to conduct interviews to identify red flags and high-risk indicators from applicants
- Sample applications, interview forms, and reference forms

Active Shooter: Run/Hide/Fight (14 minutes)

Through the first 4 months of 2023, there have been 187 mass shooting events in the U.S. These situations are unpredictable and chaotic, which is why a plan of how to respond should be in place before an event takes place.

Also available in Spanish

This training covers:

- The Run, Hide, Fight method for reacting to an active shooter situation
- Secondary concerns first aid for victims and communicating with first responders

Workplace Violence: Prevent the Threat (30 minutes) Approximately 2 million Americans are victims of workplace violence each year. In fact, workplace violence can occur in churches as well as other organizations.

This training covers:

- The major causes and types of workplace violence
- Warning signs and how to prevent it

Parent Training (67 minutes)

Parents play a critical role in safeguarding their children while they are participating in church ministries.

Through this training, parents will learn:

- Common grooming behaviors sexual predators use with parents and church staff
- What to do if a parent suspects abuse
- Teaching your child about keeping themselves safe



Terms

Alternate Member: One who is elected to serve should the member of their congregation be unable to attend or participate in Annual Conference.

Bar (of the Conference): The boundaries that define the area in which votes for Annual Conference matters may be cast.

Building Beloved Community Reflections: Provided by CORR and COSROW reminding us of our diversity and inclusion.

Consent Calendar: Groupings of legislation addressed in legislative sections that receive at least 80% of votes for approval or 80% of votes disapproving. The consent calendar is placed before the body at least two hours before action is taken on this grouping of legislation.

Daily Proceedings: Order of business while we are together as an Annual Conference.

Delegate: One is elected as a delegate to General or Jurisdictional Conference.

Legislative Sections: All members to annual conference are assigned to a legislative section where they vote on assigned documents to build the AC consent calendar.

Member: One is a clergy or lay member of Annual Conference.

Motion: The way the Conference acts on legislation. For example, should someone want to amend a piece of legislation that is before the Annual Conference, you would seek the Bishop's attention and state "I move we amend _____" (filling in the blank with the way they would like to see the document amended. Amendments are also needed in writing). If that motion is seconded, it would be brought before the Conference for action.

North Central Jurisdiction: The Northern Illinois Annual Conference is part of the North Central Jurisdiction, which includes the conferences of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. Every four years the North Central Jurisdiction and other jurisdictional conferences meet to discuss and vote to elect new bishops, converse about matters of the Jurisdiction, worship, and fellowship together.

Order of the Day: The agenda as agreed upon by the Annual Conference and established by the Chair of Daily Proceedings in consultation with the Bishop.

Organizing Motions: Motions made at the beginning of our work so that we all know what the agreed upon rules for working together are, for example: where people with a vote are allowed to sit, where people without a vote are allowed to sit (there are other rules as well).

Plenary: The plenary compromises all members entitled to be seated within the bar of Annual Conference.

Point of Order: A call to attention to make sure that the correct procedure is being followed.

Robert's Rules of Order: Rules by which we have agreed to function as we meet. A motion needs a second in order for it to be voted upon, etc. so that there is a method to our work together.

Second: Someone agrees with the motion and desires the body proceed to work with motion.
