

Annual Conference Leadership

Bishop Dan Schwerin is serving as the bishop of the Northern Illinois-Wisconsin Episcopal Area. Bishop Schwerin was elected to the episcopacy at the North Central Jurisdiction gathering in November 2022. Bishop Schwerin is husband to his wife, Julie, and a father, grandfather, and poet. He is a graduate of Perkins School of Theology and did post-graduate Bowen family systems theory work there. He has enjoyed many contexts for pastoral ministry, including urban and rural churches, a new-church plant, and superintendent of two districts. He also pastored a multi-staff downtown church, which became a Reconciling Congregation and launched a beloved community of nonprofits that benefitted children dealing with poverty, organized people who wanted to battle generational poverty, and offered




music lessons for children. After the General Conference of 2019, Bishop Schwerin was asked by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung to lead a collaborative effort with conference partners to increase racial justice and radical inclusion. He then served as Assistant to the Bishop in the Wisconsin Conference. He has also served on the General Conference Task Force on Funding Patterns in the UMC.



Ordination Service Preacher, Bishop Karen P. Oliveto, is a bishop, pilgrim, pastor, activist, and scholar. She was consecrated as a bishop of The United Methodist Church on July 16, 2016, and retired on August 31, 2024. She holds a B.A. in Psychology from Drew University, a Master of Divinity from Pacific School of Religion, a Master in Philosophy and a PhD in the Sociology of Religion, both from Drew. Bishop Oliveto has served in rural and urban settings in parish and campus ministries in New York and California. She has also served as the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs at Pacific School of Religion and has been an adjunct professor of United Methodist studies at the school from 2004 to 2016. She has also been an adjunct professor at Drew University, Brite Divinity School, Illif School of Theology, and Yale Divinity

School. She was elected to the episcopacy after serving as the first woman pastor of the 12,000-member Glide Memorial United Methodist Church in San Francisco. She served Glide from 2008 until her election as bishop. Bishop Oliveto has the distinction of being the first openly LGBTQIA+ bishop in The United Methodist Church. She and her wife, Robin Ridenour, a nurse anesthetist and United Methodist deaconess, met in junior high church camp and have been together for 25 years. They were married in 2014.

Special Guest, Bishop James Boye-Caulker, is serving as the bishop of the Sierra Leone Episcopal Area. He was elected in December 2024 during the West Africa Central Conference gathering held in Ghana. He holds a Higher Certificate in Pastoral Studies from Sierra Leone Theological College, and a Bachelor's degree in Theology at the Gbarnga School of Theology in Liberia. He also holds a Diploma in Theology from Cliff College in England and a Master of Philosophy degree in Theology from the University of Sierra Leone. He is currently a PhD candidate at the Fourah Bay College, University of Sierra Leone. Prior to his election, Bishop Boye-Caulker served in many churches and was the full-time District Superintendent of the Western District, a position he occupied since 2016. He served as the Secretary of the Con-



ference Board of Ordained Ministry and also Chairman for the Lowell & Ruth Gess Eye Hospital Local Management Committee, Kissy, Freetown. Bishop Boye-Caulker is married to Janet Juma Ruth Boye-Caulker and they have three children: James, Jimmy and Julia.



Ecumenical Guest, Rev. Dr. Craig Howard, began serving as Executive Presbyter of Chicago at the end of 2021. Before coming to Chicago, he served as Presbytery Leader of Giddings-Lovejoy in St. Louis, Ministry Relations Officer with the Presbyterian Foundation, and as Presbytery Executive for the Presbytery of Milwaukee. Craig is a native of Chicago's south suburbs. He completed his undergraduate work at DePaul University, and earned MDiv and DMin degrees from McCormick Theological Seminary. Craig's first career was in business as an insurance executive. After being ordained to specialized ministry, Craig served as Director of Recruitment and Admissions at McCormick Seminary and later as Chief Development Officer. Craig has served several racial ethnic churches including Latinx, African American, Korean,

and Euro American — and also a new church development in the Pentecostal Church. Craig's spouse is the Rev. Marilyn Gamm, who is also a pastor in St. Louis. They have two adult daughters who both live in Chicago.

Bible Study Leader, Rev. Dr. Reginald Blount, is a Murray H. Leiffer Associate Professor of Formation, Leadership, and Culture and director of the Center for the Church and the Black Experience, both at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. He earned a bachelor's degree from Tuskegee University, a master of divinity degree from Candler School of Theology, and a PhD from Northwestern University in cooperation with Garrett-Evangelical.

Dr. Blount believes the purpose of Christian education is to be emancipatory, to set people free to be children of God and co-creators with God. Many personal, social, spiritual, and institutional hindrances prevent the people of God from becoming all that God has created them to be. His research interests are in the areas of African American identity formation, adolescent and young adult identity formation, Christian education theory, Christian education and the black church, and African/African American spirituality. He is currently researching the role of the black church in the identity formation of African American youth.

Chair of Annual Conference Worship, Rev, Jacob Tipantasig-Wolverton, is the lead pastor at Community United Methodist Church in Naperville. He brings over 25 years of experience in leading both traditional and contemporary worship, children's and youth ministries, adult discipleship, and pastoral ministry. Rev. Tipantasig-Wolverton earned a master of divinity degree from the Methodist Theological School of Ohio and an associate's degree in biblical studies and bachelor of ministries from White Horse School of Ministries in West Lafayette, Ind. He also holds a bachelor of arts in music education from St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind. He is a member of the Queer Clergy Caucus, Reconciling Clergy, and actively advocates for



children in the foster care system. As a follower of Jesus, he has made it part of his mission to show love and compassion to these children and the foster families.



Worship Leader, Drew Jones Marquez, serves as the Director of Contemporary Worship at Community United Methodist Church in Naperville. A lifelong musician and worship leader, Drew's journey began on the South Side of Chicago, where he nurtured his passion for music and ministry. Drew has an extensive background in both education and ministry. A former lead vocalist in the United States Air Force's regional band, he has a rich history in music and performance, having composed over fifty original songs. Drew brings a unique blend of musical expertise, leadership, and a deep commitment to fostering a grace-filled, welcoming environment for all. He is passionate about guiding the young and seasoned through authentic worship and spiritual growth.



Gospel Proclamation Halle. Halle NIC Praise Team

Leader: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ recorded according to Luke 8:40-56

People: Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

When Jesus returned, the crowd welcomed him, for they had been waiting for him. A man named Jairus, who was a synagogue leader, came and fell at Jesus' feet. He pleaded with Jesus to come to his house because his only daughter, a twelve-year-old, was dying.

As Jesus moved forward, he faced smothering crowds. A woman was there who had been bleeding for twelve years. She had spent her entire livelihood on doctors, but no one could heal her. She came up behind him and touched the hem of his clothes, and at once her bleeding stopped.

"Who touched me?" Jesus asked.

When everyone denied it. Peter said. "Master, the crowds are surrounding you and pressing in on you!"

But Jesus said, "Someone touched me. I know that power has gone out from me."

When the woman saw that she couldn't escape notice, she came trembling and fell before Jesus. In front of everyone, she explained why she had touched him and how she had been immediately healed.

"Daughter, your faith has healed you," Jesus said. "Go in peace."

While Jesus was still speaking, someone came from the synagogue leader's house, saying to Jairus, "Your daughter has died. Don't bother the teacher any longer."

When Jesus heard this, he responded, "Don't be afraid; just keep trusting, and she will be healed."

The Ministerial Education Fund

On behalf of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and each of the persons set apart for ministry today, thank you for participating in this ordination service!

Because you are interested in each of these ministers and in quality ministry for each local church, we want you to know how vital the Ministerial Education Fund is in funding the work of the Board of Ordained Ministry, at both the national and conference levels.

The Ministerial Education Fund is a beautiful example of connectional ministry at its best! The fund is a portion of the "Support of the General Church" category within the Apportionment figure for each local church and is 5.8% of the entire apportionment.

The Northern Illinois Conference retains 25% of the funds given to MEF, and uses these funds for (among other things) seminary scholarships, continuing education grants, and developing continuing education events.

Of the 75% of MEF funds sent on to the General Church — approximately 84% is used to support our 13 United Methodist seminaries, and most of the remaining portion supports and enhances the Course of Study, which prepares local pastors.

Therefore, you can see that the MEF has a direct impact upon the quality of ministry at the local church level! We hope and expect that you will be a staunch supporter of the Ministerial Education Fund.

Commissioning and Ordination Glossary

Commissioning relates persons to the annual conference and to the ministry of the provisional clergy members within the annual conference. Commissioning confirms that the person is being sent for service and the church invokes the Holy Spirit to empower commissioned ministers during their time of provisional membership. The provisional period is a time of full service in which one is licensed for the practice of ministry (¶¶ 317.1) and a period of formation in one's journey toward ordination and full membership in the annual conference (2020/24 Book of Discipline).

Ordination of deacons and elders is both to an office and for a lifetime. Ordination confers a new identity as well as authority for ministry. The new identity of the ordained is always claimed in relation to Christ and his call to leadership and service with the baptized for the life of the world. The authority is always exercised in stewardship of the mysteries of the gospel and of the church's mission in the world. Ordination has to do with who the person is as well as what the person does in ministry (2020/24 Book of Discipline).

Deaconesses and Home Missioners are laity called by God to a lifetime relationship in The United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice and service (¶ 1913). They are consecrated by a bishop, then commissioned in their local annual conference.

Local Pastors answer God's call to serve the mission of Jesus Christ in a local congregation under the authority of a license for pastoral ministry. They are not itinerant ministers and are not ordained or elected into full membership of the annual conference. A local pastor's authority is within their appointment setting and does not extend beyond it.

Deacons are called by God, authorized by the church, and ordained by a bishop to a lifetime ministry of Word, Service, Compassion, and Justice. They serve the community and congregation in a ministry that connects the two. The deacon's ministry connects the church's worship with its service in the world (¶¶ 328-331).

Elders are called by God, authorized by the church, and ordained by a bishop to a lifetime ministry of Word, Sacrament, Order, and Service. The elder serves in ministry and servant leadership giving pastoral leadership to order the life of the congregation (¶¶ 332-335).

Commissioned/Provisional Members are in the ordination step between candidacy and full membership. Those applying for ordination serve as a provisional member for a minimum of two years. Provisional membership ends with ordination. (¶¶ 324-327).

Clergy Members in Full Connection have been ordained as a deacon or elder and have been voted into conference membership. Their lives and work are amenable to the annual conference and they are supported by and accountable to that annual conference.

The Northern Illinois Conference partners with Safe Gatherings as an individual online training option.



Safe Gatherings is an online abuse prevention program that screens and educates staff and volunteers to help prevent abuse of children, youth, and vulnerable adults in group settings. When using Safe Gatherings, upon successful completion of the application, background and reference checks, and the online training program, each applicant will receive documentation of approval valid for three years, and will have continued access to the online training program for an entire year. Screening includes obtaining background checks and professional references. The \$35 training is comprehensive, and applicants may complete the online training modules at their own pace. The training typically takes about 2 hours to complete and are offered in english or spanish.





Lay Member Reporting Guide

Dear Lay Member to Annual Conference, Attendance at the annual conference session is the basis for the work you will do in your congregation throughout the year. An effective member of annual conference informs the congregation about The United Methodist Church in the Northern Illinois Conference and around the world. Write your reactions about proceedings, discussions, worship experiences, special ceremonies, music, and so on as preparation for later sharing with your congregation. Keep an accurate record of the votes taken that will have an impact on the congregation's finances, operations, and ministry. Share information with your congregation about your experience. Remember that the report to the congregation and the church council is to be given as soon as possible but not later than three months after the close of the annual conference session. ☐ Share with the your church the ministries NIC and UMC are doing with their apportionments and encourage your church to pay 100% of its apportionment. ☐ Search the Northern Illinois Conference websites and The United Methodist Church news sources. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS IN BRIEF

EVERY SINGLE VOTE MATTERS

These amendments to The United Methodist constitution were approved by General Conference delegates in 2024. They must be supported by two-thirds of the voting members of all the Annual Conferences in order to be ratified.


Constitutional Amendment voting will take place in Plenary 4 on Tuesday, June 10.

Ballot 1: Worldwide Regionalization

If ratified, this amendment would organize the United Methodist Church into geographic bodies.

The United States-based United Methodist Church (and predecessor bodies) sent missionaries and formed UM churches around the world. This created a paternalistic relationship between the church in the U.S. and the church in other countries ("Central Conferences.") In some regions, the UMC is flourishing. However, these conferences still have an unequal "child" relationship to the "parent" church in the U.S. This is evident in how the Book of Discipline is updated: the UM delegates from around the world can vote on these changes, but not necessarily follow them, because the annual conferences outside of the U.S. can adapt the Discipline to their contexts.

This amendment would place all conferences on an equal footing. We would share the essential parts of the Discipline and adapt other parts to respective cultural contexts. A coalition of Central Conference leaders strongly commends this restructuring.



Ballot 2: Inclusion in Membership



If ratified, this amendment would add "gender" and "ability" to the list of characteristics that do not bar people from membership in a United Methodist congregation.

The amended paragraph 4, article IV in the constitution would read, "All persons, without regard to race, gender,

ability, color, national origin, status, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments, upon baptism be admitted as baptized members, and upon taking vows declaring the Christian faith, become professing members in any local church in the connection."

Ballot 3: Racial Justice


If ratified, this amendment would strengthen the denomination's longtime support for racial justice.



The new paragraph would read, in part,

"... Racism opposes God's law, goodness and love and diminishes the image of God in each person. Fueled by white privilege, white supremacy and colonialism, the sin of racism has been a destructive scourge on global society and throughout the history of The United Methodist Church... Racism must be eradicated. Therefore, The United Methodist Church commits to confronting and eliminating all forms of racism, racial inequity, colonialism, white privilege and white supremacy, in every facet of its life and in society at large."

Ballot 4: Educational Requirements for Clergy Voting Rights



If ratified, this amendment would clarify the educational requirements for clergy who may vote for clergy delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

This amendment to paragraph 35, article IV aims to clarify the educational requirements for clergy who may vote for clergy delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. It spells out the meaning of an M. Div. degree and

its equivalents for United Methodists outside of the United States, thus bringing uniformity to the qualification requirements and ensures that all voting clergy have met the denominational standards for theological education.

Voting Eligibility on Constitutional Amendments

WHO IS eligible to vote:

- Clergy members (elders and deacons) in full connection (¶ 602.1.a) This includes clergy on sabbatical leave, voluntary leave of absence (¶ 353.7), family leave (¶ 353.7), transitional leave (¶ 353.7) or medical leave (¶ 356).
- Lay members of Annual Conference (¶ 602.6)
- Diaconal ministers and active deaconesses are lay members of annual conference and as such have the right to vote (¶ 33, Article II of Constitution)
- · Lay Members by Virtue of Office

WHO IS NOT eligible to vote:

- Provisional deacons and elders (¶602.1.b, Book of Discipline)
- Associate and affiliate clergy members (¶602.1.c, Book of Discipline)
- Full-time and part-time local pastors (¶602.1.d, Book of Discipline)
- Clergy on Honorable Location (358.2) or Administrative Location (359.3)
- Observers, Alternate Lay Members not certified as sitting for an absent Lay Member

Packets of ballots for eligible members will be available for pick up at the Information Desk starting on the morning of Tuesday, June 10. Members are responsible for their ballots; no new ballots will be given out.

Debating and Amending

Lay and clergy members of Annual Conferences may debate the constitutional amendments as printed. However, they MAY NOT change the wording of the proposed amendments in any way.

Terms

Alternate Member: One who is elected to serve should the member from their congregation be unable to attend or participate in Annual Conference.

Bar (of the Conference): The boundary that separates voting members during plenaries from others present.

Beloved Community Reflections/Montoring: Provided by CORR and COSROW, to remind us of our diversity and inclusion.

Consent Calendar: Groupings of legislation addressed in legislative sections that receive at least 80% of votes for approval or 80% of votes disapproving. The consent calendar is placed before the body at least two hours before action is taken on this grouping of legislation.

Daily Proceedings: Order of business while we are together as an Annual Conference.

Delegate: Those who are elected to be voting delegates at General and/or Jurisdictional Conferences.

Legislative Sections: All members to annual conference are assigned to a legislative section, where they vote on assigned documents to build the AC consent calendar.

Member: All clergy and an equal number of lay people who have been elected by their churches to vote at Annual Conference.

Motion: According Robert's Rules of Order, which the conference follows, a member presents a matter for a vote by making a motion. The person would rise to a microphone and when recognized the by bishop, they would say, "I move [the matter they present for a vote]." (Proposed adjustments, or amendments, to a proposed item are also presented as a motion.) A motion must be seconded by another voting member in order to move forward. NIC requires amendments to be submitted to the conference secretary in writing using the Motion/Amendment triplicate form.

North Central Jurisdiction: The Northern Illinois Annual Conference is part of the North Central Jurisdiction, which includes the conferences of Northern Illinois, Illinois Great Rivers, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Dakotas, West Ohio, East Ohio, and Wisconsin. Every four years the jurisdictional conferences meet to elect new bishops, converse jurisdictional matters, worship, and fellowship together.

Order of the Day: The agenda as agreed upon by the Annual Conference and established by the Chair of Daily Proceedings in consultation with the Bishop.

Organizing Motions: Motions made at the beginning of the conference that include the rules of order for the proceedings. These may include setting the bar, limiting the number of speeches per motion, and other matters.

Plenary: The plenary compromises all members entitled to be seated within the bar of Annual Conference.

Point of Order: A call to attention to make sure that the correct procedure is being followed.

Robert's Rules of Order: The conference uses Robert's Rules of Order to organize its work.

Second: In order for a motion to be considered by the body, another member must second it.
