for the balance of our Conference year to furnish
him the opportunity of uniting with the said
Conference at their approaching session which occurs

To Rock River Conference

CIRCULAR.

Reverend Sirs,

Fellow Clergy:

At the last anniversary of the New-York State Temperance Society, it was resolved,
"That a committee be appointed to prepare and present an address to the annual or some other
meeting of the several ecclesiastical bodies in this State, as well as to the larger ecclesiastical
bodies in the United States; and request them severally to take such action in the temperance
cause, as may in their judgment appear most likely to promote the same." And on further mo-
tion, it was resolved, That the Executive Committee of the State Society appoint a committee
of seven to carry the above resolution into effect."

In accordance with these resolutions, we have been appointed the Committee to bring the
subject of temperance to your distinct consideration. Permit us, respectfully, to state our
deep conviction of the importance of your co-operation to the future advancement of this great
enterprise. It needs the councils, the prayers, and the earnest efforts of the churches. It is
true that voluntary associations reach masses of mind not yet brought under the direct influ-
ence of religious ministrations; and thus far they have been beneficial beyond our most sanguine
hopes. But the full blessing that we are now encouraged to expect, cannot be accomplished
until this sacred cause shall be urged forward by your co-operation. In our sanctuaries we
rest, under God, our best hopes for the triumphs of temperance. There rise the fountains of
pure and sound principles; and thence flow to our land the blessings of sanctified sentiment.
These influences are destined to lift up our wretched world from the pollutions of vice: suffer
us to solicit, that they may be consecrated to temperance in such particular manner, as to your
wisdom shall seem the best adapted to the nature, condition and claims of the subject.

Report of Committee on Missions 1840

The Committee to whom was referred the Consideration of the results and prospects of the Missionary cause in the N. E. Church within the bounds of the Rock River Annual Conference report as follows.

Although we have for some time been engaged in this glorious enterprise and although much has been accomplished by the blessing of God upon our instrumentality yet by a united and untiring effort ^{much more} may and ought to be accomplished.

That this conclusion is correct is obvious from the fact that we find so great a difference in the amounts collected on the different charges which, as to temporal ability, appear to be of equal strength.

We are deeply impressed with a fear that some of the laborers in God's vineyard refrain from pressing the claims of the Mission cause least their importunity should impair or diminish the attention of the people to themselves.

On the contrary your Committee would suggest that one of the best means of inculcating pure benevolence and securing the support of the ministers of the gospel at home is to lay upon our people the wants of the Heathen world and thus induce them to become, themselves, Missionaries in spirit.

The Committee, appointed by the Rock-River Conference, held at Mt. Morris, to investigate the administration of Alfred Brunson, on the Upper Mississippi Missions, met in the Methodist Chapel, at Plattsburg, W. S. on the 24th ultimo.

The Chairman informed the committee that due notice had been given to Bro. Brunson, who had manifested a disposition to treat the committee with indifference, questioning their power to act in the premises.

Bro. Thos. W. Pope appeared before the committee, and made certain communications; - upon which the committee were led to the following conclusion, to wit: That Bro. Brunson retained monies belonging to Bro. Pope, without his consent, about a year, at the expiration of which time, he exacted, in an irregular, not to say dishonorable manner a note of hand for the amount, without interest for the time the money had been retained. It further appeared from Bro. Pope's statement, that Bro. Brunson endorsed Seventy-one dollars (\$71.00) upon that obligation without his consent, and which he (Pope,) did not consider it his

duty to pay. The committee were further informed, that the monies, for which said obligation was given, are still unpaid. And also, that the supplies for the second half of the year which terminates Bro. Pope's labors on the mission were not received by him, (Bro. Pope.) all which is respectfully submitted
